NEWS FROM MAURITIUS

A Tribute to Occupational Therapists
Mauritius is a sparkling island nation off
the southeast coast of the African
continent in the southwest Indian
Ocean. Training in occupational therapy
approved by the World Federation of
Occupational Therapists started at the
University of Mauritius in 2003.

By far, the Ministry of Health was the sole sector whereby occupational therapists could work and be

recognised. However, during the past few years, occupational therapy in Mauritius bloomed into a magnificent sunflower.

Since 2007, more non-governmental organisations on the island recruited occupational therapists and when the fabulous work of these professionals were known; the Ministry of Education took on board occupational therapists in its newly set up special education needs intervention team designed for children having difficulty in coping with their studies in mainstream schools. With the marketing of the profession by both the occupational therapists occupational therapy students at the University of Mauritius, the Ministry of Security followed employed occupational therapists to serve the geriatric population. Even the University of Mauritius recognised the value of the profession and recruited a locally trained occupational therapist to hold the post of Occupational Therapy Programme Coordinator.

Occupational therapists trained Mauritius are expanding their horizons three of our colleagues are currently working abroad and further four have upgraded their skills in specific fields in occupational therapy such ashand rehabilitation. interpersonal communication and group dynamics and applying concepts of creative ability with different client groups. In addition, one occupational therapist designed snozelen room used for children with developmental disabilities. Other nonorganisations governmental are presentlyworking on this concept to such controlled multisensorv stimulation within their occupational therapy service. There is also one occupational therapist who initiated a school for children with disabilities. I am proud of the evolution of Occupational Therapy in Mauritius and may this fruition mark the beginning of a new era collaboration heightened

solidarity between different island organisations on and the occupational therapists. For the future generation, try to win the whole ecosphere of occupational therapy!

He was the first Head of Department of the new Education programme for the training of occupational therapists at KCMC, Tumaini University in 1999 and was the first President of the Tanzanian OT Association. He was a trained occupational therapist from Kenva.

Since 2000 he was very involved in the development of occupational therapy in Tanzania and worked closely with the Tanzanian Department of Health and the Heads of the University. He did the most wonderful job and everyone loved him.

Great tribute must be paid to him for the contribution he made to the profession of occupational therapy in Africa.

Omolade spent 27 years developing the occupational therapy services at the Lagos University Teaching Hospital where she became Chief occupational Therapist.

She was committed to improving the quality of occupational therapy education in Nigeria and was actively involved in the development of the Bachelor of science curriculum at university level. Omolade served as the President of the Nigerian Association of occupational Therapists, Vice Chairman

of OTARG and Nigerian Delegate to the World Federation of Occupational Therapists.

She worked tirelessly to re-establish the declining occupational therapy services in the early 2000's through the voluntary Services Overseas (VSO) programme.

Her strength of character and vivaciousness and exuberant personaility endeared her to colleagues. She will be very fondly remembered.

Joy Varney Blackburn



Joy Varney Blackburn, well known and revered occupational therapist, passed away on Wednesday 13th April 2011 in South Africa.

She trained as an occupational therapist at the Vona du Toit College, part of Pretoria University.

Joy worked at psychiatric hospitals in South Africa. From 1960 to 1970 she lectured and taught pottery at the Occupational Therapy Vona du Toit College.

She dedicated herself to doing research on mentally handicapped children with self-injurious behaviour and published a number of articles and also authored a chapter in the 2nd edition of the book "Occupational Therapy in Psychiatry and Mental Health," ed. Crouch. She was very involved with the training of

Occupational Therapy Assistants during this time.

Joy was part of the inaugural committee of the POTs Group (Psychiatric OTs) in 1985. She and her second husband Malcolm (married in 1986) attended the first OTARG (Occupational Therapy Africa Regional Group) Congress in Mauritius in 1991.

At the beginning of the 1980s Joy was an inaugural member of the establishment of SAISI (South African Institute of Sensory Integration). She served on the Board for more than 20 years. During this time she was the 3rd Chairman and served for 4 years from 1988 to 1993.

Joy was elected President of OTASA (Occupational Therapy Association of South Africa) in 2001. Her involvement in OTASA was extensive and she made a big impact, particularly in occupational therapy in the psychiatric field.

Joy was a beautiful person in all respects. She was an intensely creative person, a master potter and wild-life lover and expert. She set an example as an occupational therapist in the real sense of the word. She was a wonderful wonderful colleague, а friend. wonderful mother and wife and companion. and а wonderful occupational therapist!

IN CONCLUSION

A sad note to end on, but also a very important one. These people made a considerable contribution to our profession in Africa and were very also involved in OTARG.

All that remains is a welcoming note to the 7th OTARG Congress in Livingstone. Do try very hard to get there. It is going to be a very exciting event.
